What Amendment prohibited the sale and distribution of alcohol?

SLOSHED BY THE MAN



During the first 11 years of the Volstead Act the government appointed 17,971 people to the Prohibition Bureau

Of that, 13,586 are fired for bribery, extortion, theft, falsification, conspiracy, forgery, and perjury

Convictions for liquor offenses rose from 35,000 in 1923 to over 60,000 in 1932

It's estimated that there were between 200,000 and 500,000 speakeasies in the US



X 1,000,000

In 1928 it's estimated that doctors had netted nearly \$40 million by writing prescription whisky

BOOTLEGGING TO THE MAN

(ORGANIZED CRIME STATS DURING PROHIBITION)

3 months prior to the 18th Amendment becoming affective, \$500,000 worth of liquor was stolen from Government warehouses.



\$500,000

Al Capone built an entire criminal Empire by bootlegging



From 1919 to 1929, it is estimated that bootleggers brought in nearly \$500 million with their alcohol distribution services



X 10 MILLION



Homicides increased from 6.8 per 1,000 in 1920 to nearly 10 per 1,000 in 1929.



It's estimated that 10% of government officials had ties with the mafia during prohibition

DRINK BY NUMBERS



Estimated consumption of alcohol pre-prohibition: 1.46 proof gallons per capita.



Estimated consumption of alcohol during prohibition was 1.63 proof gallons per capita.



Average # of deaths per 100,000 due to alcoholism pre-prohibition: 5

Average # of deaths per 100,000 due to alcoholism during prohibition: 3

Arrests for drunken and disorderly conduct increased



Arrests drunk drivers increased
